

*Dear Parish Family,*

The Gospel for the Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Mark 10:35-45) begins with the sons of Zebedee, St. James and St. John, making a request of Jesus. They ask the Lord that, in His glory, they “may sit one at” his “right and the other at” His “left.” Our Lord tells them that they do not fully comprehend what they are asking. Jesus asks them, “Can you drink the cup that I drink or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?” They confidently respond, “We can.”

This exchange resulted in the other ten disciples becoming “indignant at James and John.” Our Blessed Lord proceeds to tell them that “whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all.” Indeed, “the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many.”

There is a saying that “To serve is to reign.” Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI said: “The world offers you comfort; but you were not made for comfort. You were made for greatness.” What does Jesus mean then “to serve” and therefore to be great in the kingdom of God? It means to put the needs of others ahead of our own. True love means willing the good of the other person(s). It means to choose to be servants and to make the choice gladly. To truly serve means to serve, not out of sense of guilt or out of a desire for a reward. True service means serving others out of love. This is always rooted in our personal relationship with God, who is love.

Jesus truly came “to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many.” He is the perfect example of service. He did nothing apart from the Father. This is important for Christian servants to understand. Seeking to do the Lord’s work must always be done in communion with God and God’s will. Good intentions must be wed to a prayerful spirit or else we can end up “spinning our wheels.”

There is much work to be done in the Lord’s vineyard. May more souls be inspired to undertake the high adventure of discipleship and make the Lord’s work their own.

**Spiritual Adoption of Unborn Human Life Starts Today!**
